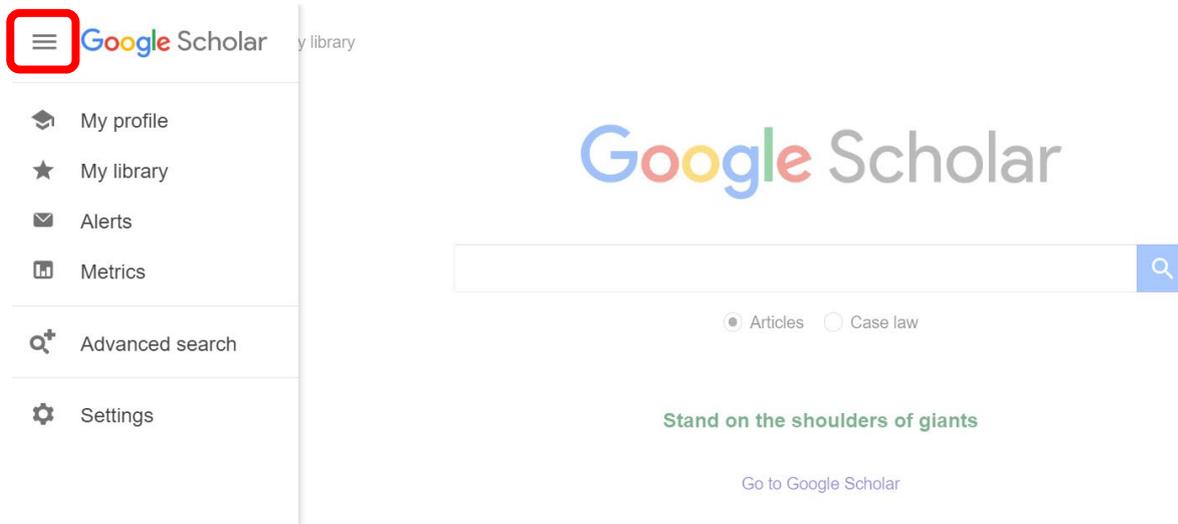


Q. How can I use Google Scholar and know which articles are available via Library subscriptions?

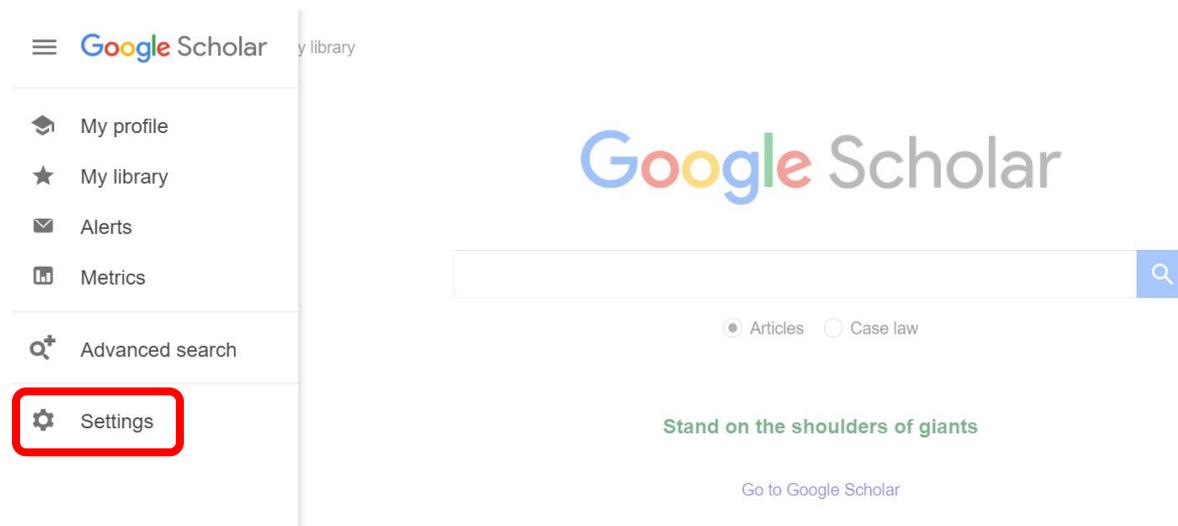
We recommend that you link Google Scholar with the Library's subscribed content to ensure that you're able to quickly access more articles in full-text.

Step 1: Open Google Scholar by going to <https://scholar.google.com.au/>

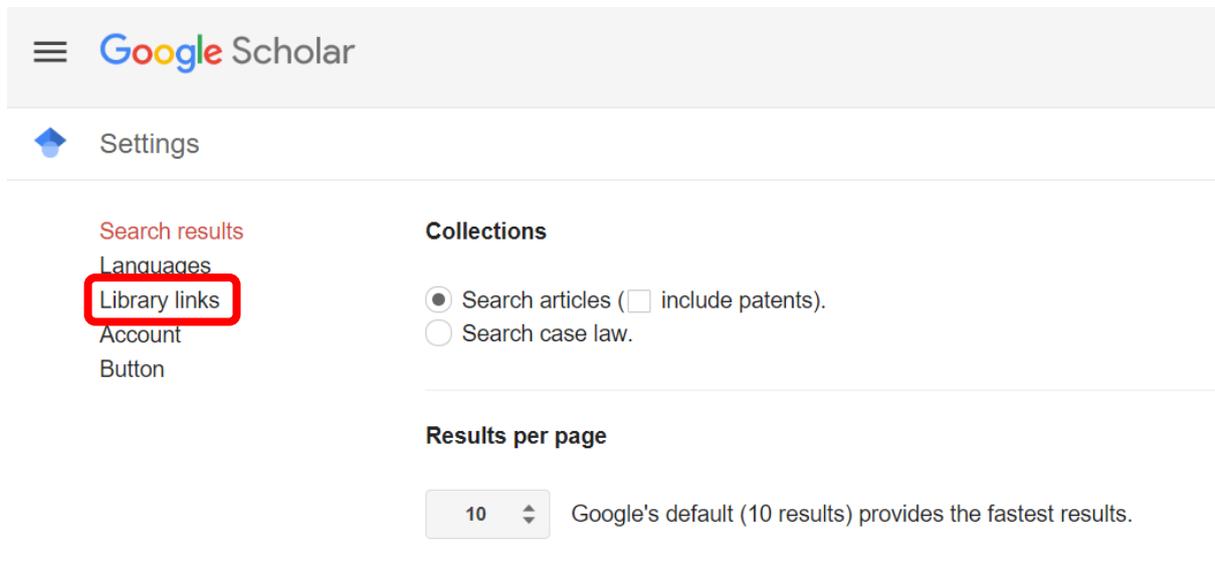
Step 2: Click on the menu icon at the top left of the screen 



Step 3: Then select "Settings" from the left-hand menu

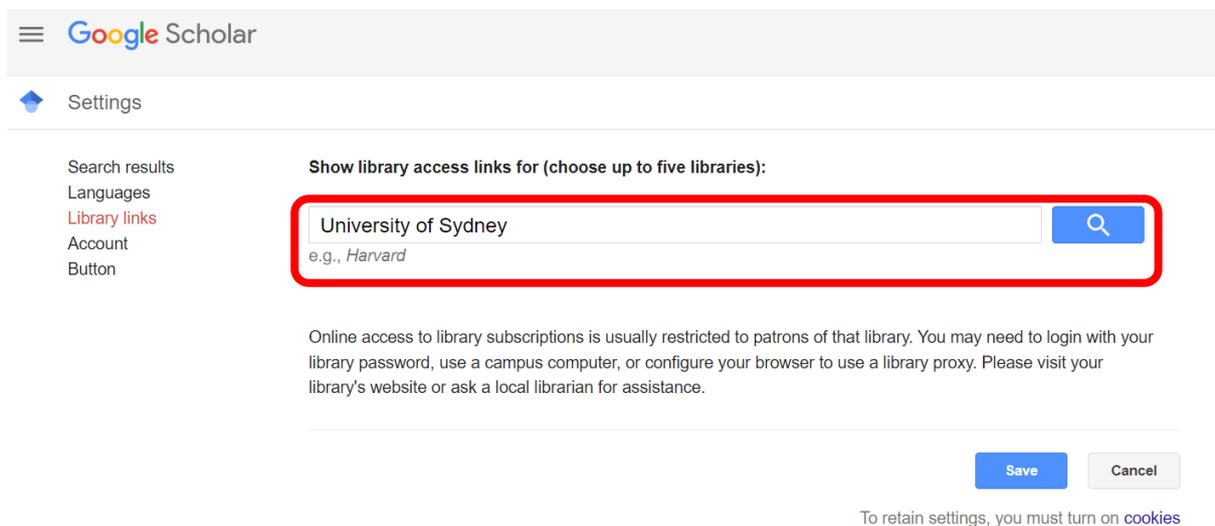


Step 4: Click on “Library links” from the left-hand menu

Step 7: Perform your search in Google Scholar and then click on the blue **@ University of Sydney** links on the right-hand side to access full text. **Note:** If you haven't already authenticated with your UniKey credentials, you may be prompted to do so after clicking on the University of Sydney links.
